
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


INSIGHTS: Healthy By Design Dining

We're at a threshold. Now is a great moment to rethink, redo, and remake the food culture of our schools, because change in that sphere supports not only health and well-being, but also equity and inclusion.

To shift the system, we need both bottom-up and top-down approaches. Bottom-up, healthy eating at school should be the centerpiece of the day in joyful, comfortable, inspiring places with plenty of room for collaborative, social activities. A dining space is one of the places that truly brings educators, students, families, food service experts, wellness coaches, and community partners into alignment around well-being. Mealtime occasions are when folks who may not otherwise meet come together, and where much can be gained by recognizing what binds people together (great food, sharing, socializing) while also building a learning community of care and respect. Top-down, redesigning policies, practices, and provisions for schools around health and nature-based models will ensure that students have opportunities to become agents of change and leaders in sustainable food systems. This is where innovation can be found: in the coordinated, multidisciplinary pursuit of a vision for healthier, resilient futures.



Where We Learn to Eat: Five Key Mindsets

We're rapidly moving away from industrial food production and service models toward the emerging "fourth place" concept. Where home is the first place, office or school the second place, and spaces like stand-alone cafes third places, fourth places blend aspects of all three. Thinking of spaces to eat in schools as fourth places brings to light the importance of designing for all the senses and for the beneficial emotions that arise from engaging with what's alive and dynamic.

Growing food, being in touch with nature's cycles, hands-on making and refining one's personal sense of taste, comfort, and delight can be what the future of food looks like. Let's begin to design this future with five mindset shifts that enable readiness for change.



N° 1 INTUITION MINDSET

Go with Your Gut Feelings

Some days, we opt for an apple instead of an orange, or arugula instead of iceberg. That preference likely is based not on analytical reasoning, but on something we call "gut feeling." There's no fixed formula for intuition, but the science behind taste, mood, and emotion is powerful enough to be a driver of food marketing – and it can be an equally powerful driver of school dining and learning. Humans have up to 10,000 taste receptor cells, each with a lifespan of only 8-12 days, that send perceptions of taste to the brain. Let students exercise their keen sense of taste intuition. Exploring, dreaming, and messing around with choice and taste gives students reliable feedback between their intuition and intellect.



N° 2 TOGETHER MINDSET

Bridge the Distance

There's no more primal human need than being together and no more basic human tradition than sharing a meal with others. This food-based "social glue" is on the continuum of health and well-being. A togetherness mindset enables students and teachers to unwind, connect informally, share stories, and even disarm tension. Much can be gained when we recognize what binds us together, even as we respect our differences. Consider the benefits of offering a variety of delicious foods and drinks in an accessible range of microenvironments designed for relaxation, conversation, collaboration, and engagement.



N° 3 FREEDOM MINDSET

Cater to Choice


We all appreciate the opportunity to seek out our own comfort zones and happy places in which to think, feel, and connect. A freedom mindset embraces what's possible when students can customize, express, and exercise responsible agency over their own needs. Create a network of healthy food microkitchens paired with cozy social nooks, immersive collaboration coves, and see-and-be-seen touchdown perches that honor the many ways students prefer to gather. Include open space micro-lounges with movable elements, shaped seating, and a wide range of healthy, engaging atmospheres.



N° 4 CREATIVITY MINDSET

Cultivate Culinary Exploration

Culinary professionals know the value of creativity. As world-renowned Danish chef René Redzepi writes: "Staying open to learn and be inspired by other people, cultures, and professionals from other fields is where we find new knowledge and fresh perspective. We are lifelong learners. We adapt, improve, try, and try again." As that quote demonstrates, a creativity mindset is at the heart of educational and culinary exploration. Learnercentered environments with a culinary twist, such as exploratory food labs, wonder ateliers, discovery think tanks, teaching kitchens, seed vaults, grab-n-go gardens, and compost walls, break down curricular barriers and are exemplary for the opportunities they offer to "try and try again" inside and outside the classroom.



N° 5 ACTIVIST MINDSET

Honor the Heartfelt

Today, students of all ages are keenly aware of their place in and impact on the world and recognize the power and value of standing for what they believe in, including what they choose to eat. Many young people are moving toward plant-based options, while others are learning more about their cultural heritage and the ways their forerunners cultivated, prepared, and shared food. Approaching school dining with an activist mindset means respecting and accommodating heartfelt issues, from animal rights to gender equality, sustainability, and climate change. Anticipate the need for food ecosystems in learning communities to foster student voice through choice, discourse, debate, protest, and the healing arts. "Sun streaming through tall windows... the fragrance of roasted beans and fresh yeasty rolls, and the steady background sound of conversations, laughter, and cups clinking. This is where friends meet, where neighbors share news, where business is done, where strangers start talking. This is a third place." Ray Oldenburg

Inspirational Places

The Great Good Place

Urban sociologist Ray Oldenburg, who coined the term "third place" and is the author of *The Great Good Place*, continues to inspire new ways of reimagining dining as the heart of a community's social vitality.

The third place is not home and not work, but instead one of the physical settings that have throughout history encouraged a sense of warmth, conviviality, and that special kind of human sustenance we call community. These settings include cafés, taverns, libraries, and piazzas, where people from different walks of life gather to hang out in an informal atmosphere.

"This simple concept reminds us that human connections need nurturing, and that community depends on such simple things as a few tables, a friendly host and a willingness to see what happens when we get together face-to-face," writes Karen Christensen.

The following ten dining-focused vignettes explore a range of ideas on how to redesign school dining. Curated with contemporary and iconic VS furniture pieces, each vignette encourages you to rediscover how design, function, and flexibility transforms space into a warm, inviting social atmosphere. "Atmosphere matters, and so does location," writes Ray, "nothing contributes to a sense of belonging in a community as much as membership in a third place."

COFFEE HOUSE

Today's learners mix academic and social activities. According to Ray Oldenburg's research, "the third place, typically, is a watering hole of one sort or another, and face-to-face conversation is the main activity. The general rule is that beverages are of such importance as to become veritable social sacraments." The coffee house gets at what most students crave, an inspiring place to see and be seen, and to share with others.

Planning Tip: Mix up furniture combinations to foster social buzz. Walk into a busy coffee house on a weekday morning, you will likely see small groups of 2-4 people clustered around tables, some chatting, others listening to music, some working on their own in a cozy corner with coffee and snacks, books, and notebooks spread out on the table.

DINING ROOM

A key purpose of dining at school is to leverage the intersection of nutrition, health, and learning in a physical space to support social connection. The dining room concept emphasizes where we learn to eat as a place of intention: communal sharing, close connection, and slowing down to relax and experience mealtime together.

Planning Tip: Design for growth, development, and a sense of belonging by including a range of appropriately sized, comfortable furniture combinations. Include a servery storage concept to encourage hands-on participation in mealtime rituals.

A canteen is a small establishment that serves as an informal social hub, part cafeteria, part snack bar, part storage chest with compartments for light food prep and eating utensils. 



KITCHEN




